- 6.2. Does the Institution has a management Information System

Advanced software are used in the library and administrative sections of the college.

6.3. Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

#### 6.3.1. Curriculum Development

Since the curriculum and the syllabus are designed by the university, the college has no freedom to restructure the curriculum.

#### 6.3.2. Teaching and Learning

- Set up two LCD projectors and audio systems in each department to support a better learning environment.
- Use of multiple teaching methods and modes of instruction such as visual, read/write methods were introduced.
- Tutorial hours were restructured to encourage dialogue between students and teachers and among students.
- Peer tutoring system is introduced to develop interpersonal professional, and cognitive skills of students to a higher level
- The research form at the English department was begun with a view as to get teachers as academicians to renew perspectives on knowledge. The forum conducts at least a lecture each month with scholars in the field talking on philosophers and had four talks so far.

• As part of the new initiatives in education, Sullamussalam Science College has introduced 'Online Courses' for students in various disciplines. In the first year itself, 35 students enrolled for the 'Hour of Code' course and 30 students got the certificates. Next year onwards we are planning to elaborate the programme by including more subjects from various Universities like MIT, Oxford, Cambridge etc.

#### 6.3.3.Examination and Evaluation

Internal examinations were restructured with a centralized examination and a department level examination in each semester. After each examination department level parents meetings were called and results were analyzed in the presence of parents and proper instructions were given to students and parents.

#### 6.3.4.

IQAC has given instructions to all HODs to include more research level topics for their Seminars, Assignments and Project works to inculcate a research mind among the student community.

#### 6.3.5. Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

- Digital Library has been expanded with more resources in various subjects. New computer system and a printer are also been added for the benefit of the students and teachers.
- 248 books have been added during this academic year.
- 'Astra', a project to develop the skills in Computing. This was formally inaugurated by Hon. Chief Minister Sri. OOmmen Chandy on 20th September 2014. Ultimate aim of this project is to setup an incubation and development centre for the girl students of our college who are not able to go distant cities for their job. V.K. Muneer, Assistant Professor, department of Computer Science is the coordinator of this project.
- Smart Lab To inculcate research and innovations in the field of computing, a smart lab is setup under the Department of Computer Science. Various applications and projects are under way. This could be converted into a commercial technology lab, if we get funding for the expansion. Habeeb. P, Assistant Professor, Department of Vocation programmes, is the coordinator of the lab.
- The Canteen facility are also upgraded with more spacious dining rooms for students and a spacious open kitchen with stainless steel work tables and storages.
- Six new toilet facilities for girls and three class rooms have been constructed during this period.
- The construction of a National level Indoor stadium with the financial aid from UGC has been started.

Efforts of the college to uplift the rural community are among the strengths of the college. The college has ICT enabled classrooms and a dedicated, academically oriented and researchminded faculty. The faculty inspires students to apply for projects, summer courses, seminars, workshops and regular courses at various nationally and internationally reputed institutions.

The management committee that financially supports the developmental activities of the college strengthens the institutional structure. A Skill Development and Resource Centre for Women sponsored by the Kerala State IT Mission helps the college in their effort for the empowerment of women community. The funds for indoor stadium sanctioned recently by the University Grants Commission will no doubt help the students in improving their skill in sports. At the same time the structure can temporarily be used to serve the purpose of an auditorium till a regular one is built.

Government has not sanctioned any aided courses since 1999 to our college, therefore the institution has been compelled to run self-financing courses that cannot ensure quality. We overcome these constraints with highly motivated crew of teachers. The fact that the college has no research department is a disadvantage. The college is also lacking in a separate library building and an auditorium.

The institution is situated in a rural area; the students hail from economically and academically challenged environments and therefore a proper academic orientation becomes imperative. The delay in conducting the End Semester Examinations by the University is a major hurdle in planning student support activities.

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## **ANNEXURE I**

The IQAC periodically gathers feedback from the stakeholders and acts on it. The Alumni meet every year and provide suggestions on infrastructure developments improving classroom facilities and introduction of new courses through the secretary of the alumni to the principal.

The PTA executive meets twice every year evaluate curricular and extra-curricular progress and makespertinent suggestions. The class PTA meets twice after the first and second internal exams to evaluate the progress of the students. The tutors brief the parents on students' academic performance in the classes and internal examinations. Feedback from the parents and the students are elicited on teaching learning.

Regular feedback is taken from the students by the head of the department at the end of every semester and instructions to teachers are given to improve the teaching learning method. Besides this informal feedback from the students is taken by individual teacher. Feedback from the students by the manager is taken regularly and communicated to specific teachers. Feedbacks prove valuable in implementing UGC guidelines.

## **ANNEXURE II**

#### **PRACTICE-1**

#### 1- KNOWLEDGE PERSPECTIVES IN HIGHER EDUCATION

#### **GOAL**

In the present system of education there is no clear link between the school system and the under graduate stream. In order to bridge the difference in perspectives, the newly admitted students are given an orientation course in their respective subjects. his week long course apart from creating a general awareness in the recent advances in the subject also introduces them to the e-learning modes adopted in modern education.

The goal is to prepare the students in a broader educational framework

The aim is to make them research oriented and imbibe the spirit of lifelong learning so that graduation is not a mere lead to remunerative jobs

#### THE CONTEXT

As mentioned, severing of two streams of education is detrimental to the higher goals of pedagogy. In order to orient the students in their respective fields of knowledge integrating the conventional methodologies and the restrictive curriculum, a timetable, followed in special format is adopted in a week long session of structured exercises. Unlike in the higher secondary schools where the students received a broad spectrum of knowledge, a deeper explorative facet of pedagogy has to be adopted in higher education. This is not easy as the curriculum in colleges is too heavy and the expectations are too high. Though in schools the present methodology promotes scientific thinking, there is no scope for that kind of stretched-out learning mode in higher education where very complex concepts need to be grasped within the limited time of the semester. Therefore, a well-conceived bridge course becomes imperative especially since the introduction of CCSS which was adopted in the higher education stream in 2009 to support the critical pedagogy practiced in schools since 1998. Hence the Foundation Programme.

#### THE PRACTICE

Much before the first year admission begins, the teachers of each department sit together and plan the structure of a 5-day orientation programme. As soon as the admission processes are complete, the foundation courses begin. Each department has its own specialized programmes based on the nature of the course and the needs of the participants. For instance, in a science course the focus is on experiment and logic whereas in the humanities course the imaginative content is stressed on. However the faculty are always careful to observe the philosophic and humanitarian side of science and the material utility and functional values of literary studies.

The design of the content and the structure of the five day workshop is done with the above observation in mind. However since this is done outside the regular curriculum it takes a great deal of effort to convince the stakeholders of the significance of the exercise as the first semester is limited to barely 90 days and scarcely a week can be spared for the introductory

exercise. The format has to be carefully designed in order to effectively fulfill the goals of orientation- as it is a psychological and intellectual preparing the ground.

Last year as is usual, in the English department, a theatre workshop was organized as part of the orientation programme. This programme strengthened the view that theatre is a collaborative activity that can offer unique polyphonic counter education that proves an effective tool against commoditization of knowledge in the era of globalization. The focus of the physics and mathematics department in a week long course was to promote engaged learning. Topics like scope and excitement of physics and web-assisted learning were discussed with increased student participation. The commerce department organized programmes like meet the entrepreneur and introduction to basics of commerce and industry.

# Provide evidence of success such as performance against targets and benchmarks and review results. What do these results indicate?

The performance of the students in the end of their examinations show marked improvement in the last two years. Though the competence of student joining the institution is much lower than in the previous year, the output has been fairly remarkable. The number of our students qualifying competitive examinations to renowned universities has increased in the last few years.

The record of students' answer papers from the first semester internal exam is kept as record to gauge the improvement in students' skills through the years to the second internal in the sixth semester. Every year this provides a clear proof of the success of our foundation course that sets the tone for learning attitudes. The foundation course is further supported by the study materials of high standard provided by each department.

#### PROBLEMS ENCOUNTERED AND RESOURCES REQUIRED

# Please identify the problems encountered and resources required to implement the practice in about 150 words

The foundation courses require much planning time and energy on part of the organizers. Since sometimes the admission process lags on due to change in University schedule, a week-long preparing ground exercises, prove expensive. Other infrastructure facilities need also be looked into. The available class rooms are not conductive to conducting these highly structured classes which introduce them to their core subjects. Moreover, as there is no provision for this course in this syllabus, there is extra burden on the teachers. Since the college is not an autonomous institution many of such innovative academic programmes are done solely on faculty initiative. For these advanced programmes envisaged by the faculty 100% ICT enabled class rooms are essential. Moreover, there is no government post for network administrator in the college. The management takes the financial responsibility and posts a person in the capacity.

# Any other information that may important to the reader for adopting or implementing best practices in their institution.

Number of graduate students in the last four years gaining admission to the institution of higher learning like, the ISI (Indian Statistical Institute) EFLU (English and foreign languages university) CUK, University of Pondicherry, ISI, IIS, CUSAT, NIT, University of Calicut has been on the rise.

#### 2. CARING FOR THE SICK AND OLD: A LESSON IN HUMILITY

#### **GOAL**

At Sullamussalam Science College we aim at the spiritual, creative and intellectual growth of the young people who are our students, to help them confidently confront the globalized, corporate world. Our non-academic practices are focused on their holistic growth as a balanced, humane and socially committed citizen of the world.

#### THE CONTEXT

Students Initiative in Palliative Care (SIP) is a step in that direction. The devotion and commitment instilled in the young through caring for the sick and the elderly help in their intellectual growth too. Knowledge acquired empirically open their intellect to highly specialized textual knowledge says studies on multiple intelligence.

#### THE PRACTICE

The volunteers of SIP of our college actively involve themselves in the activities of the Palliative Care Clinic, Areacode. This year the SIP Care members conducted an orientation Programme and a training Programme for the first year volunteers to create an awareness among the uninitiated first year students about the need and importance of palliative care initiatives.

The volunteers are active and work round the clock to support and help those sick and in dire need of financial help. This year, they collected around 3.5 lakh rupees for the treatment of patients who suffered from cancer, kidney failure and other serious ailments. As they routinely do every year, they organized a day-care programme on 29 November 2014, the first one this year, with ten paraplegic patients. Malappuram D.E.O Mr.Safarulla inaugurated the programme and Ms. Mariath, Calicut university librarian was the chief guest.

The SIPC volunteers undertake awareness programmes regularly to enlighten and counsel students. As a part of anti-tobacco, anti drug campaign, the SIPC volunteers in collaboration with NSS, conducted a street play 'Unarthupaatu' on 2nd March.

The play done by students was an introspective act in which they questioned themselves and their perspective on life and its goals .A two- day exhibition on Palliative care was also organized on 10 and 11 March 2015 which was an eye-opener giving us a better insight into lives marginalized and uncared for.

# Provide evidence of success such as performance against targets and benchmarks and review results. What do these results indicate?

The service of the students of the palliative unit of the college has found meritorious mention in various contexts IAPC (Indian Association for Palliative Care-Kerala chapter) in their magazine called *Swanthanam* has included an article on the activities of the palliative unit of the college. The number of members of the community who have been supported by our students is increasing every year. The consistent and continued monitoring of those patients who had attended and gained training in workshops make these exercises worthwhile. All the products the trainees have made or produced are sold at the Friday fair at the college. Therefore

the training does not go futile. The paraplegic patients are earning members of their family now.

### PROBLEMS ENCOUNTERED AND RESOURCES REQUIRED

# Please identify the problems encountered and resources required to implement the practice in about 150 words

As the palliative unit of the college students in palliative care holds key positions in the venture, they need more facility to organize the activities. They should be provided with the technology to communicate and connect with the other volunteers. The unit works on the meager collection taken from the students by the volunteers through cards provided at the beginning of the year. The university syllabus is too heavy to incorporate such extracurricular activities. Even co-curricular activities have to be rushed through since the introduction of the credit-based semester system in higher education stream.

# Any other information that may important to the reader for adopting or implementing best practices in their institution.

The palliative care unit of the college apart from providing succour to the sick and invalid community provides them opportunities to become self- reliant and even supplement family income. The palliative care initiative has worked miracles with paraplegics. The training in soap making, umbrella making given to the eighteen paraplegics has been extended to larger groups with the trained persons training the other groups.

In a tie-up with the Block Panchayath, materials are provided free of cost to the beneficiaries and since marketing is also done with the help of the palliative unit in the college, the patients are encouraged to continue the practice. The vision of the great educators has thus been realised in this socially committed student group. The institution also fulfills its role as a social and cultural establishment supporting the community.
